DAES' training programme for Adults (2018):

Aims at providing second chance education to adults who prematurely left the system. The DAES diploma grants access to higher education and is recognized as equivalent to the secondary school diploma, it is completed in parallel to ones' professional activity.


International state schools (2018):




Early Childhood Education

Multilingual education in ECEC (2017):
