


Tertiary Education and Transitions to work



Students drop-out of vocational training

Male students with an immigrant background, and/or family financial problems are most likely to drop-out.



Aims to incorporate professional work experiences into vocational training, with one third of training activities taking place in the assigned workplace. Evaluations show that students with Dual VET qualifications accumulate more work days, more stable contracts and higher wage incomes.




